





Scissors




Coloured paper

The plan



This workshop is about all about creating a digital collage using Adobe Illustrator.

It's split up into 5 parts, each part as a basic overview in this document as well as detailed step by step videos linked at the bottom of the pages.

1. Draw the outlines using the pen tool
2. Adding Colour
3. Playing around with composition and layout
4. Exporting and saving as JPEG
5. Uploading and sharing our work

By the end of this workshop you should have a better understanding of the pen tool and how to explore different colour combinations in Adobe Illustrator

There are also some extension activities at the back

Draw the outlines using the pen tool

We'll be creating a Matisse Inspired collage. Who's Matisse? Well, he's a guy that did these massive cool paper collages.

- You'll need to open Adobe Illustrator and place in the Reference file.
- Lower the transparency of the reference file and lock it in place
- Then using the pen tool draw around paper cut out shapes.
- The pen tool can be tricky, so don't worry if you don't get it right away.



Cutting out shapes



Some shapes might need to be cut out like this one, it has a circle in the middle of it.

- First draw out your shape using the pen tool, draw the outer and inner circle
- Select both the shapes using the black arrow and whilst holding down the shift key
- The using pathfinder (go to Window › pathfinder) choose the ‘minus front’ icon.



Colour and composition



- Now you've got your outlines, you want to try play about with colour
- Click on the shape using your black arrow and then click on either of these icons to change to change colour (follow the video tutorial for a step by step)
- You can also go to Window > Swatches > Swatch Libraries to see a whole set of different colours and palettes and choose a palette that works for you
- Try making a new document and copying and pasting your artwork over so you can have a few different versions in the different colour
- Make 3 different colour combinations. (These can be as separate documents)
- Make 3 different composition combinations. Move the shapes around, resize, add and remove any to create your own design (These can be as separate documents)

Saving, exporting and sharing

Nearly done! Now we're going to save and share our work.

- To save as illustrator file: file › save as › save .ai file
- To save as JPEG: file › export as › export as jpeg (click 'use artboards') › export
- Upload to your jpeg poster to padlet

Extension activity

Now you've done that the following are some extension tasks:

- Taking your own coloured paper, cut out your own shapes using scissors and lay them out. Explore and experiment with different shapes and ideas. Then take a photo of your final one. Repeat the same steps, but this time using your own designs and work.
- Print out the pattern paper and use it to cover books or as wrapping paper. Use the final pattern on something else. Give it a real world use, be inventive and surprising! Share your ideas on the Padlet below.
